Customer Service Survey Draws Helpful Responses

Chamblee is committed to providing excellent customer service to Chamblee residents, businesses and visitors. In its aim to create a high level of quality service, the city launched a customer service survey in October. Four kiosks containing iPads are located in city departments – the Police Station, Parks and Recreation, Development and City Hall. The survey had 26 responses in the first month of operation and 50 responses by the middle of November. The responses are helping the city objectively measure customer satisfaction from each individual respondent.

The customer service survey offers a series of questions that target the respondent's interaction with individual departments within the city. Questions such as "How effective was the staff at solving your concern?" and "Do you feel more informed about the issue and next steps after your interaction with staff today?" will be found in the Chamblee customer service survey. Residents, businesses and visitors can also complete a survey at home by taking the online version at surveymonkey.com/r/chambleecustomerservicesurvey.

Property Tax – Senior Exemptions

Resident homeowners in Chamblee who are 65 or older can apply for a senior homeowner tax exemption. Those who qualify are exempt from city taxes.

Requirements

All parties listed as owners on the property deed must:

- Be 65 years or older before Jan. 1, 2017.
- Hold a current Homestead Exemption designating the property as primary residence.
- Supply proof of age (driver’s license or other identification) for all owners listed on the deed.
- Apply for the exemption between Jan. 1 and Feb. 28 by filling out a simple form in person at City Hall, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m.

The application will be processed and notification of the exemption will be sent to DeKalb County for the 2017 tax year. The exemption will be applied to the 2017 property tax statement. City taxes will be removed; however, storm-water and sanitation fees will remain. Once this exemption has been granted, there will be no need to reapply. Additional exemptions from DeKalb County must be filed with the county separately.

Call the County Tax Commissioner’s Office, 404-298-4000, to find out about all exemptions. Persons who have 100 percent disability status from the Social Security Administration or the Veteran’s Administration also are eligible for this city exemption. Fireworks Banned Due to Drought

With New Years Eve just behind us, it’s important to remember Gov. Nathan Deal issued an executive order banning the use of commercial fireworks indefinitely in 110 Georgia counties. The order says, “Over the preceding six months, many areas of the state have experienced significant drought conditions and there have been numerous instances of uncontrolled fires that seriously threaten the welfare of citizens of this state.” The counties identified as drought-stricken cover much of north and central Georgia. The order came as a series of wildfires roared through north Georgia, spouting plumes of smoke that have filled the sky in metro Atlanta and threatened to expand into residential areas.

Peachtree Road Mural Coming to Life

Artist Michael Jones is in the process of bringing the Peachtree Road mural to life. The tinted primer has been applied and the painting, which will take several months, has begun. The mural design will incorporate many scenes and symbols that represent Chamblee’s history and community.

Peachtree Road will remain open but the wall is close to the northbound travel lane, so traffic cones will be placed at the intersection to give workers adequate space. Please exercise caution and reduce speed while driving through this area.

An official dedication ceremony will be conducted once the mural is complete.

City Closings & Holiday Trash Pick Up

Martin Luther King Jr. Day – City offices will be closed on Monday, Jan. 16. If your trash and recycle day is Monday, pickup will be on Tuesday, Jan. 17. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday pickup days will remain the same.

Presidents Day – City offices will be closed on Monday, Feb. 20. If your trash and recycle day is Monday, pickup will be on Tuesday, Feb. 21. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday pickup days will remain the same.

Because we utilize extra manpower and trucks during the holidays, the brush schedule will be delayed by a few days. The regular schedule will resume during the second week of January.

DeKalb Mayors Discuss Progress, Connectivity, Assets

The mayors of Chamblee, Dunwoody, Brookhaven and Doraville came together in November at a roundtable to discuss transit, economic development and growth. The meeting was held at the Chamblee Civic Center.

Chamblee Mayor Eric Clarkson spoke about the city's rail-trail project that will include pedestrian and bicycle connectivity. The corridor will connect to downtown Chamblee as well as to the Chamblee MARTA station.

Also discussed:

- The mixed-use developments at the GM plant in Doraville and the State Farm regional headquarters in Dunwoody.
- Tax incentives that went along with those two projects.
- The Brookhaven/Oglethorpe MARTA station and its connectivity to the Dresden Drive mixed-use project.

The group felt that transit is a major avenue to appeal to the younger generations.

The mayors noted the culturally rich Buford Highway area and lauded its economic impact on the area. Mayor Clarkson added that Chamblee is working with the City of Doraville and the Atlanta Regional Commission on a Livable Centers Initiative for Buford Highway to enhance the area.

CPL Assumes Development Services for City of Chamblee

Open House Jan. 17, 5-7 p.m.

Beginning Jan. 1, Clark Patterson Lee (CPL), a full-service architecture, engineering and planning firm, will assume community development services for the City of Chamblee. CPL is working alongside current staff during this transition to learn the current procedures to offer a fluid conversion between service contractors. The firm has developed a survey to be released at the beginning of the year to hear from applicants about how the city's process is currently functioning. After spending time observing these processes, CPL will systematically roll out improvements in a manner that will not disrupt applications currently in process and should improve the overall experience.

What can you expect on the first day of the transition? CPL is known for its customer service. Applicants and community members can expect all employees to be accessible and to address questions and concerns. There will be new faces in each position, but the team will provide opportunities to get to know everyone. As a part of the transition, CPL will host an open house for all community members, businesses and permit applicants on Tuesday, Jan. 17, 5-7 p.m.

Staff will contact applicants who are currently in process to make introductions. CPL is committed to engaging the community and to serving the City of Chamblee by developing a relationship of dependability and quality of service.

CPL provides privatized government services to communities throughout the metropolitan Atlanta area. The organization has implemented processes that are proven to improve efficiency, quality of service and transparency of local governments.

Chamblee Rail Trail Re-Opens

A section of the Chamblee Rail Trail that was closed during the construction of retaining walls for Parkview on Peachtree has now reopened. The section runs between the Peachtree Boulevard underpass and Keswick Park and is now safely available for pedestrians and cyclists.

“With the retaining walls in place – along with the bridge and parking deck – we can clearly visualize the ‘finish line’ for this walkable shopping, dining and healthy-living village that will be Parkview on Peachtree,” notes Timothy Connolly II, CEO of Connolly, developers of the project. “There’s still a lot of work to be done, but we’re excited for what this property will bring to the community when it opens in 2017.”

Chamblee Acquires Dresden Park



City of Chamblee Mayor Eric Clarkson and councilmembers cut the ribbon on the newest addition to Chamblee's park system at Dresden Park on Dec. 6. The 24-acre park was acquired from DeKalb County in early 2016 and brings the number of city parks to eight and increases the total

acreage to 76. It offers a soccer field, ADA playground, concession building and restrooms, walking trails, pavilion and picnic tables and additional benches throughout the park.

Some of the improvements the City of Chamblee made to Dresden Park prior to opening include: removing hazardous

trees, repairing the playground, painting the concession building, renovating restrooms, posting signs and rules, replacing railings and repairing trip hazards on sidewalks. The park is at 2301 Dresden Dr.

City Reaps Rewards With Healthy Employees

For the past two years, the City of Chamblee has used Humana as its insurance provider and participated in the HumanaVitality wellness rewards program, which promotes healthy living. The city now has employees who are being rewarded for making healthier choices. The city is able to reap financial rewards as well.


Detective Ray Ice, who was diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2015, says, "Simply put, participating in the HumanaVitality program saved my life. I had no symptoms, no issues,

no problems. The yearly exam discovered my aggressive prostate cancer, and within two weeks, I had robotic surgery. Three blood tests so far have cleared me of the illness, that, if unchecked and undiscovered, would have killed me by now. My advice: Participate, listen to your boss, get checked!"

Sixty percent of the city's employees participated in the program in 2016. Fifty employees earned silver status; 15 earned gold status; and 28 earned platinum status. Along with these numbers, 87 percent of the city's employees participated in the city's "Know Your Numbers" event. Because of the contract type and their involvement, the staff saved six percent off the renewal rate for medical benefits when the the contract was negotiated for 2017. In 2015, only five employees earned platinum status in the program.

HumanaVitality helped the city's employees:

- Get out, get active and achieve those goals
- Turn completed goals into great rewards



A small herd of goats hired by City of Chamblee recently made quick work of their task, clearing the underbrush at Keswick Park. The goats chewed their way through approximately 20 acres. Parks and Recreation staff says the goats ate everything, but particularly enjoyed mimosa, kudzu, vines, poison ivy, poison oak, blackberries and briars. The goats were provided by Get Your Goats Rentals and monitored all day long by two livestock guardian dogs – one to patrol the perimeter and one to protect the goats from coyotes, stray dogs, snakes and other predators. Goats are growing in popularity for this type of service. They provide a machinery- and chemical-free alternative to clearing brush, and they leave behind natural fertilizer.

A monthly summary of the data received is provided to the city manager and department directors. Then it is shared with city staff to help them continue to improve the services.

One of the questions in the Customer Service Survey asks for the overall level of satisfaction with the service received by the specific department the respondent interacted with. About 70 percent of the responses have been positive; 10 percent were average; and 20 percent were negative.


Each department director is

taking carefully considered steps to make sure that the concerns of each respondent are addressed quickly, even contacting the respondent directly by email where appropriate. For example, a recent code enforcement complaint submitted

through the app was misrouted to the email of a former employee. The resident didn't receive a prompt follow-up, and therefore filled out a survey expressing dissatisfaction. That was personally followed up by a staff member. The

code enforcement issue was resolved promptly and steps have been taken to ensure that this issue does not reoccur.

Council Rejects Parks and Recreation Master Plan

This fall, the Chamblee City Council unanimously rejected the 10-Year Parks and Recreation Master Plan presented by Lose and Associates. "This plan fell short of meeting any of our expectations. We were seeking direction on how to improve our current park assets and programming as well as a roadmap for obtaining future park land. Citizen engagement should play a major role in determining the future of Chamblee parks, and we did not feel this was adequately accomplished," said Councilman Brian Mock. "The plan wasn't a complete wash, however, as it contained some really good information about demographics, population projections and national standards," noted Parks and Recreation Director Jodie Gilfillan. "The city will use this information to build upon its own citizen surveys and public input meetings that will be conducted in 2017."

Chamblee Parks and Recreation Youth Sports

Registration is now open for youth soccer and T-ball. The registration deadline is Feb. 17. Practices will begin on Feb. 27, and games will start on March 11. The eight-game season will conclude on May 13.
